Asked the same question, Kevin Burke of Defending the Caveman, Excalibur's Broadway comedy, would be a musician. Annette Verdolino of Luxor's Menopause The Musical might be a graphic designer. Louie Anderson said he'd be a self-help therapist.

"It's all about making people feel better," the Excalibur headliner said.

MGM MIRAGE couldn't agree more. In addition to rotating comedians at various theaters and arenas, Company resorts offer six permanent comedy shows, and they're all designed to make the thousands of guests who pour into showrooms each year feel better.

"They're popular not only here, but across the whole country right now," Mr. Sturm said. "People are looking to laugh, to escape their lives, to go out and have fun, and comedians provide that."

Ms. Verdolino, who plays an unassuming housewife in Menopause The Musical, certainly

"It's a party every night," she said. "I'm shocked at how many hugs

and smiles we get and people telling us they can't remember the last time they laughed so hard."

All about "the change," the show follows the story of four women who randomly meet at Bloomingdale's and think they have nothing in common, but soon realize they're not all that different from one another. The production became a permanent fixture at Luxor last May and shares the resort's Atrium Showroom with adult revue FANTASY and Carrot Top.

"I love Carrot Top, and I'm not just saying that because we see him all the time," Ms. Verdolino said. "He's really, really great. He's so much funnier than people realize. Even when he appears on TV, it doesn't begin to crack how great he is."

In addition to his trademark red hair, part of Mr. Thompson's appeal is his ability to come up with and deliver fresh material. The comedian said his material is constantly evolving, and he is proud that no two shows are the

"I change things every day. It may be just one joke or a sound effect or lighting cue, but every day it's different," said Mr. Thompson, who works through a trunk-full of gag props each show. "It's always fun to turn people who've never seen my show into fans; but for people who have seen it, I want to change things up for them so they can see a different show each time."

He may like changing things up for his show, but he prefers to keep one thing the same: the location.

"It's a great gig to not have to travel. I've done all that – the buses, the airplanes, the suitcases. After a while, that stuff becomes the hardest part of your job. Your show is the fun

part. The traveling is the work," Mr. Thompson said. "In Vegas, there really isn't a hard part. You go in, do your show, and go home."

That's not the only perk of headlining in Las Vegas, said Mr. Anderson.

"It's exciting because there's always a chance that you're going to get people (in the audience) not just from this country, but every country. I recently had people from the Netherlands, Romania, and England. I like getting a mix of people and seeing how I can entertain them," he said.

Appropriate for all ages, Mr. Anderson's Larger Than Life show revolves around the comedian's personal anecdotes.

"It's a fun, feel-good, clean, family atmosphere," he said. "My show is just about giving people an opportunity to forget their troubles for an hour and 15 minutes.'

And people come for just that – lots of them. So much so that Company leaders often book rotating comedians in venues like The Mirage Terry Fator Theatre, MGM Grand Hollywood Theatre, and Monte Carlo Theatre when headliners aren't scheduled to perform. This year alone, guests at The Mirage have been able to see the likes of bigname celebrities like Jay Leno, Ray Romano, and Jon Stewart.

"Although we would like to book upand-coming comedians, it's a very competitive business. For that reason, we really go after performers we feel confident will be able to sell tickets," Mr. Sturm said.

One example of such an act is Defending the Caveman. The longest-running solo show in

Broadway history, the production since 1991 has not only proven itself, but it's set out to do the impossible: explain men to women and vice versa.

"For example, if a woman says she'll call you, she means when she gets home. If a man says he'll call you, he means before he dies," said Mr. Burke.

The show, which is performed in 30 countries and 17 languages, joined Excalibur at the end of 2008. Mr. Burke works seven days a week and has performed the show more than 1,500 times.

Broadway history, Defending the Caveman is an insightful play about the ways men and women relate. Since its 1991 debut in San Francisco, the production has been seen by more than 8 million people in 30 countries and 17 languages. Kevin Burke headlines the show at Excalibur.
